THOMAS McINTOSH

American pianist, Thomas McIntosh was born in Washington D.C. where he made his orchestral debut at the age of twelve in a Mozart Concerto with the National Symphony Orchestra. He made his New York recital debut at the age of seventeen. Mr. McIntosh received both a Bachelor and Master of Science degree from the Juilliard School of Music where he had the unusual distinction of specializing in three fields: piano studies, orchestral conducting, and choral rendering.

Mr. McIntosh is an international prize winner and has performed and conducted in more than twenty five countries of the world travelling throughout North America, South America and Europe.

Mr. McIntosh has recorded both the "Twelve Transcendental Etudes" and the "Six Paganini Etudes" of Franz Liszt for Unicorn records in Great Britain and Nippon-Columbia in Japan. Commenting on these discs, a prominent critic wrote:

"The young pianist is one of the artists most in evidence in the North American scene, part of a

generation of brilliant musicians among whom are Andre Watts, Van Cliburn and others. McIntosh faces with courage, balance and good taste the 'Transcendental Etudes' of Franz Liszt and gives us his own signature—clear, alive, convincing and exuberant..."

Describing one of Mr. McIntosh's concerts held in London, the *Daily Telegraph* wrote, "... Anyone who begins a programme with Beethoven's C minor Sonata op.111, and finishes with Liszt's Twelve Transcendental Etudes must have nerves of steel and a formidable technique..."

In 1973 Mr. McIntosh was appointed soloist/conductor of 'The City of London Chamber Orchestra'. With this orchestra he has recorded the Liszt "Malediction" Concerto and the "Concerto da Camera" by Stephen Dodgson. The latter work was written by the British composer specially for Mr. McIntosh.

Mr. McIntosh is active in television and keenly interested in multi-media techniques and videotape presentations.

PROGRAM NOTES

Haydn
(1732—1809)

Sonata in F major
Allegro moderato
Adagio
Finale (presto)

Composed in 1773 the F major sonata consists of three movements, the two latter movements being perhaps less ambitious in scope than the opening section. The work's good humor and nature are well displayed musically in the scale passages of the first movement and the charming phrases of the finale.

Prokofiev
(1891—1953)

Sonata in A minor,
Opus 28, no. 3

Prokofiev's early works overflow with color, idea, vigor and energy; the third sonata has all of the foregoing elements in superabundance. The pianistic writing is highly idiomatic, and the musical material does not outstay its welcome.

Ginastera
(1916—)

Suite of Creole Dances

In this early work of the Argentinian composer Alberto Ginastera exotic harmony and musical energy are most important to the

success of the work. The ties to dance rhythm patterns, however, create shorter sections (as opposed to the one movement of the Prokofiev Third Sonata) and provide a base for the almost 'blues' melodies which Ginastera lavishly uses.

Gershwin
(1898—1937)

Gershwin's preoccupation with jazz and 'blues' melody is evident from the famous 'Rhapsody in Blue', through the moving songs of 'Porgy and Bess', to the vitality of the 'Cuban Overture'. These three works are good examples of his use of both jazz and 'blues'.

Liszt
(1811—1886)

One of the masterpieces of the Romantic Era, Liszt's Sonata in B minor is an example of the composer's use of 'cyclic' form (the reappearance and development of thematic material in one large-scale movement). The emotional fire and intensity of expression have secured its place among the outstanding compositions in the piano literature.

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Mr. McIntosh is active in television and keenly interested in multi-media techniques and videotape presentations.

Mr. McIntosh will tour India from November 1 to 14 and will give performances in Calcutta, Patna, Bombay, Poona and Delhi.
